



A step-by-step guide following the exact stitch charts shown in the image.

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# INTRODUCTION

This charming crochet scarf combines two adorable motifs:

1. A **kitten square**, and
2. An **apple square**.

Both motifs are then joined together with a delicate lace border to create a long, lightweight, decorative scarf. This project is perfect for beginners who already know the basic stitches or anyone who wants to practice reading stitch charts while making something cute and practical.

In this tutorial, you will learn:

- How to crochet the **Kitten Motif** (following the left chart)
- How to crochet the **Apple Motif** (following the right chart)
- How to block and assemble the scarf
- How to join the motifs
- Finishing and optional touches

All instructions follow **US crochet terminology**, which is the standard for American crocheters.

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# MATERIALS

## (H2) Materials You Will Need

- Yarn: Fingering or light sport weight cotton or acrylic (white, pink, red, brown, green).
- Hook: 2.00 mm – 2.5 mm crochet hook (adjust for tension).
- Yarn needle for sewing and weaving ends.
- Scissors.
- Optional: blocking mat & pins.

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# BEFORE YOU START

## (H2) Basic Stitches Used (US Terms)


You will need to know the following:

- **ch** – chain
- **sl st** – slip stitch
- **sc** – single crochet
- **hdc** – half double crochet
- **dc** – double crochet
- **tr** – treble crochet
- **dtr** – double treble crochet
- **picot** – small decorative loop (3 ch + sl st into first ch)
- **cluster stitches** (explained in-chart-specific sections)

Don't worry — every special part will be explained step-by-step as we reach it in the pattern.

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## PART 1 — KITTEN MOTIF

## (H2) 1. Starting the Kitten Head (Center Oval)

Follow the blue oval stitches in the chart.

1. **Make a magic ring.**
2. **Round 1:** ch 3 (counts as dc), 11 dc inside ring.  
— You should have 12 dc total.
3. Pull the ring tight and join with **sl st** to top of ch-3.
4. **Round 2:**  
Work dc increases around the oval, following the chart:
  - On the sides: 1 dc in each stitch.
  - On the top & bottom: work 2 dc in each corner stitch to elongate the oval shape.  
Total stitches will increase depending on how tight your tension is — don't worry, just follow the chart visually.
5. **Round 3:**  
Continue building the oval by adding increases evenly at the top and bottom and working straight stitches along the sides.

This creates the kitten's head shape.

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## (H2) 2. Creating the Kitten Ears

Follow the **green stitches** at the top of the chart.

Work the ears separately as follows:

### **Ear (make 2):**

1. Attach yarn to the top/side of the head where indicated.
2. ch 3 (counts as dc).
3. dc into next stitch.

4. ch 2.
5. sl st back into the starting stitch to form a point.

Repeat on the opposite side for the second ear.

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## (H2) 3. Outlining the Square Background

Follow the dark burgundy square outline in the chart.

You will now work **around the kitten head** to create the square motif:

1. Start at any point where the square begins.
2. Work a mix of **chains**, **sc**, **dc**, and **tr** exactly as shown on each side.
3. Each corner is made from:  
**(tr, ch 2, tr)**
4. Continue all around the head until you close the square.

Your kitten face should now be inside a square frame.

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## (H2) 4. Adding the Face Details

Use dark yarn (embroidery thread or black yarn):

- **Eyes:** small straight stitches or French knots
- **Nose:** small “V” shape
- **Whiskers:** 3 straight stitches on each side

Now the kitten motif is complete.

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# PART 2 — APPLE MOTIF


## (H2) 1. Starting the Apple Shape

Follow the **red stitches** in the chart.

1. **Make a magic ring.**
2. **Round 1:** ch 3 (counts as dc), then work a full round of dc inside ring.
3. **Round 2:**  
Begin shaping the apple by working dc increases around the circle.
4. **Round 3–4:**  
Continue shaping by following exactly where increases are located.  
The shape becomes wider at the top and rounder on the sides.

The bottom of the apple includes a small indentation. This is shaped by:

- dc
- hdc



• SC

Then increasing again on the opposite side.

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## (H2) 2. Creating the Apple Stem

Follow the **green stitches**.

1. Attach brown or green yarn at the top center of the apple.
2. Work: **ch 4**, then sl st back down the chain to form a stem.
3. Work a few **sl st** around to reinforce.

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## (H2) 3. Creating the Apple Leaf

Also shown in green on the chart.

1. Attach green yarn near the stem.
2. ch 5.
3. In these 5 chains, work:
  - sc, hdc, dc, hdc
4. sl st back to the base.

This creates a small curved leaf.

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## (H2) 4. Outlining the Square Background

Follow the dark blue/burgundy square shown in the chart.

1. Begin in any corner.
2. Work the combination of dc, chain spaces, and tr shown.
3. Corners again follow:  
**(tr, ch 2, tr)**
4. Continue evenly around all edges.

Your apple is now inside a perfect square.

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## PART 3 — JOINING THE SQUARES



### (H2) Assembly Method: Join-as-you-go (Recommended)

As shown in the sample scarf, motifs are joined while working their final round.

To do this:

1. Begin the outer round of a new square.
2. When reaching a side that touches an existing motif, replace **ch-2 spaces** with: **ch 1, sl st into adjoining motif, ch 1**
3. Continue the round normally.
4. Repeat for each point where motifs meet.

This creates the lace-like join used in the scarf.

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### (H2) Suggested Layout

Follow the sample scarf:

- Alternate **Kitten – Apple – Kitten – Apple**
- Make two vertical columns

- Join them as you go
- Add motifs until scarf reaches your desired length

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## PART 4 — FINISHING YOUR SCARF



### (H2) 1. Blocking

Lightly block each motif before assembly or the whole scarf after joining.

- Pin lightly into shape
- Mist with water
- Let dry fully

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### (H2) 2. Weaving in Ends

Use a yarn needle to weave all yarn ends securely on the back.

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### (H2) 3. Optional Add-Ons

- Add tiny embroidered blush dots to the kitten cheeks
- Use glitter yarn for apples
- Add tassels to scarf ends
- Create a single-row border around the entire scarf using **sc** or **picot edge**
