





Required Materials

- **Main fabric:** heavy cotton, canvas, linen, or gingham
- **Batting or wadding** (medium thickness, comfortable yet flexible)
- **Lining fabric** (optional but recommended)
- Matching thread
- Scissors
- Pins or clips
- Fabric pencil or chalk
- Sewing machine
- Iron



Dimensions of the Shown Model (for reference)



Always measure your chair before cutting

- Seat width: **approx. 40 cm**
- Seat depth: **approx. 38 cm**
- Side height: **approx. 8–10 cm**
- Under-seat allowance: **4 cm**
- Seam allowances included: **1 cm**

The pattern is designed in **one single piece**, with cutouts for the back legs.



Pattern – Cutting

Complete cover

- Cut **1× main fabric**
- Cut **1× batting**
- Cut **1× lining** (optional)



The side cutouts allow the cover to fit neatly around the chair legs.



Sewing Instructions – Detailed Steps

1 Preparation

- Transfer the full-size pattern onto the fabric
- Cut the fabric, batting, and lining

- Layer as follows:
 - main fabric **right side facing out**
 - batting in the middle
 - lining **wrong side facing out**
- Secure with pins or temporary stitching

2 Quilting (*optional but recommended*)

- Lightly quilt (straight lines or free-motion)
- This prevents the padding from shifting over time

3 Side assembly

- Shape the corners by folding up the sides
- Sew the vertical corner seams
- Carefully align the cutouts for the back legs
- Press seams open for a clean finish

4 Bottom finishing

- Fold the lower edge inward (**1 cm + 1 cm**)
- Stitch all around

👉 Optional additions:

- ribbons
- Velcro
- snap buttons

(depending on the type of chair)

✨ Style & Sewing Tips

- Gingham gives a **country chic** look
- For a modern style: solid fabric + contrasting topstitching
- If the seat is heavily used:
 - double the batting in the center
- Always test-fit the cover on the chair before final stitching

Sewing Skill Level

- **Beginner to intermediate**
- No complex construction, but precision is important for the cutouts



Possible Uses

- Refurbishing vintage chairs
- Protecting new seats
- Coordinating kitchen / dining room décor
